**President's Message,
Dianne Mitchell McKay, CGFM, CPA**

It was great to see you at our February meeting. Comptroller of the Treasury John Morgan provided a meaningful and thought-provoking presentation about the state of education in Tennessee.

In our professions, education, that is continuing education, is a topic we cannot ignore.

Once we have completed our formal education and have been on the job a few years (well, more than a few for some of us), there are few opportunities to keep up with changes in our professions. The Southeastern Region Professional Development Conference (PDC) provides one of those opportunities.

The conference held here in Nashville on March 16 and 17 not only will provide timely updates related to our professions but also will present sessions on a number of diverse subjects. In our changing environment, we cannot afford to ignore trends on the grounds that they do not affect us today—because they could very well affect us tomorrow. These changes also include our place in the environment. How many of us are still working in the fields we studied in college; how many of us have moved to positions in which any number of degrees would have served.

With the theme Open Government—Public Trust and Accountability, the PDC will offer 16 hours of continuing professional education. Our AGA President, Sam McCall, will open the conference on March 16 with the topic of government accountability. It's always useful to hear a seasoned career government employee's views on matters.

For those of us who are required to maintain knowledge of changes in accounting and auditing standards, the PDC offers several knowledgeable speakers:

- Bob Attmore, chair of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), will provide an accounting standards update.
- Michael Glynn, technical manager at the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA), will provide an auditing standards update.
- Karl Johnson, a project manager at the GASB, will speak to us about GASB's requirements for Other Postemployment Benefits

March Speaker

James E. Shmerling, DrHA, FACHE

Jim Shmerling is the Executive Director and Chief Executive Officer of the Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt. He joined Vanderbilt in June, 2002. Prior to his current position, he served as Senior Vice President of Methodist Healthcare and President of Le Bonheur Children's Medical Center in Memphis, Tennessee from 1995 to 2002, and was Le Bonheur's Chief Operating Officer from 1991-1995. He served as the Associate Director of Hospitals at Indiana University Hospitals and Administrator of the James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children from 1987-1991. His career in Children's Hospitals began in the Children's Hospital of Alabama where he progressed in administrative responsibilities from 1979-1987, the last of which was as its Associate Administrator.

Shmerling earned his Bachelor of Science Degree in Public Health Education from the University of Tennessee in 1976. In 1980 he was awarded a Master of Science Degree in Hospital and Health Administration from the University of Alabama in Birmingham. He earned a Master of Business Administration from Samford University in Birmingham and his Doctorate of Health Administration from the Medical University of South Carolina in 1999.

Dr. Shmerling is a Fellow in the American College of Health Care Executives (ACHE). He is an adjunct faculty member in the Hospital Administration programs for Washington University, the University of Alabama in Birmingham and Medical College of Virginia as well as a clinical faculty member of the Vanderbilt School of Nursing. He is a native of Nashville, Tennessee and has four children.

- eGovernment—Bill Ezell, CIO, State of Tennessee.

There is also an opportunity to learn about the National Finance Center's approach to the post-Katrina world.



Conservative Group Challenges Sarbanes-Oxley

A free-market advocacy group has filed a lawsuit that challenges the legal authority of the Public Company Accounting Oversight Board to police the accounting profession. The Free Enterprise Fund asserted in a press release that the Sarbanes-Oxley Act of 2002—the landmark legislation that created the PCAOB—“was rushed into law” with legitimate intentions but “ultimately has produced costly unintended consequences for publicly traded U.S. businesses, entrepreneurs, and capital markets.” Joining the efforts to argue against Sarbanes-Oxley are Kenneth Starr of Pepperdine University; who presided over the Monica Lewinsky case; Viet D. Dinh of Georgetown University, a former U.S. assistant attorney general; and Hans Bader, counsel to the Competitive Enterprise Institute, a libertarian think tank. Specifically, the organization argues that the PCAOB violates the appointments clause (Article II, Section 2) of the U.S. Constitution. “PCAOB members wield significant regulatory powers that bring them squarely within the meaning of Article II and should be appointed by the President with the ‘advice and consent’ of the senate, not the SEC.” —Stephen Taub, *CFO.com*. Intensive Review Course and CGFM Examinations a Success once again - Katya Silver

The Intensive Review Course is again a big hit! Offered now for the second time at the National Leadership Conference (NLC) in Washington DC on February 1 and 2, 2006, it was once again sold out at 50 participants.

After attending the two-day review course, the candidates tackled the CGFM Examinations over the next two days (with some taking all three exams in one day!). As a result, 23 of the participants passed all three (or finished up their remaining) CGFM Examinations at this event - even more than at the similar event in July of last year! Others passed one or two examinations and are on their way to completing the CGFM process.

While this “intense” experience is not for everybody, participants were attracted to the idea of completing the CGFM process in a short period of time, having a set deadline to take the examinations and saving money (the cost of CGFM Examinations is included in the Intensive Review Course fee, which is less than the cost of the three examinations). Holding an Intensive Review Course and CGFM Examinations in conjunction with AGA National Leadership and Professional Development Conferences gives the candidates one more way to reinforce the material and take the CGFM Examinations (candidates can also take the exams at Prometric testing centers anytime).

The extra reinforcement of the material is exactly what some people wanted and needed. The Intensive Review Course is not a substitute for the six days of regular instructor-led training courses. On the contrary, this course is designed as a supplement to previous preparation for the CGFM Examinations (such as attending the courses and/or using study guides). In fact, the majority of the participants have purchased the CGFM study guides before participating in the Intensive Review Course.

AGA plans to continue offering this course and CGFM Examinations at its upcoming conferences. The next Intensive Review Course is scheduled for June 15-16, 2006 (with exams on June 17-18, 2006) in conjunction with AGA's Professional Development Conference (PDC) in San Diego, CA. 

Promoting Awareness of CGFM CPE Requirements

Chapter members who hold professional certification must comply with CPE requirements. Your chapter can serve these members by providing quality education. Typically a CPE hour may be granted for each 50 minutes of participation in programs and activities that qualify. At conferences and conventions where individual presentations are less than and/or more than 50 minutes, the sum of the presentations should be considered as one total program.

The chapter's CPE records should include the following information for each CPE program or activity.

1. Sponsoring organization (your AGA chapter)
2. Name(s) of the instructor(s)
3. List of attendees
4. The location at which the program was given
5. The title of the program and a brief description of its contents (i.e., subject/topics covered)
6. The dates and length of the program
7. The number of CPE hours granted
8. Retain all CPE records for a minimum of three years
9. Evaluations of the program from instructor(s) and participants
10. The program's learning objectives and any prerequisites

Typically these requirements can be met with a signed CPE form that delineates the topics and times, and a sign-in list for attendees. Additional information regarding CPE requirements for the CGFM is available on the website at www.agacgfm.org/cgfm/.
