News from National

Thirty-Eight States Route Food Stamp Calls to India

When food-stamp recipients in 38 states have a question about the program, they get answers from someone in India. J.P. Morgan Chase & Co., which administers a key part of the program for the states, has outsourced its call center to the Asian nation. Maurice Jones, commissioner of the Virginia Department of Social Services, estimates that six or seven jobs could be created in Virginia to handle the 10,000 calls a month that are now made to India by Virginia's 195,000 food-stamp recipients. He said the Warner administration inherited the outsourcing from the Gilmore administration, which signed a contract with another banking giant, Citicorp, in February 2001. The jobs were not being sent abroad when the contract was signed, and the decision to send the jobs abroad was not the state's but the contractor's. It subsequently sold the food-stamp electronic-transfer program to J.P. Morgan, Jones said. He said the calls have been going overseas since October 2001. When the state's five-year contract expires in 2006, Jones said, he hopes the 38 states can put pressure on the bank to return the call centers to the United States—preferably to Virginia. — Tyler Whitley, Richmond Times- Dispatch. GASB Approves Statement No. 43

At a teleconference held on March 30, the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) approved issuance of Statement No. 43, Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefit Plans Other Than Pension Plans. A proposed Statement, Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions, is in reexposure until April 30. At the same meeting, the board did not object to issuance of Technical Bulletin (TB) No. 2004-1, Tobacco Settlement Recognition and Financial Reporting Entity Issues. Technical Bulletins are staff documents, and therefore are not subject to the same approval process as Statements and Interpretations. However, if a majority of the board members objected to the guidance provided in a TB, the staff would not go forward with its issuance. Both documents will be available by the end of April. Meeting Minutes

April CEC Meeting

The Nashville Area Chapter's Executive Committee met on Monday, April 12, 2004, at 505 Deadrick Street, 15th Floor Conference Room from 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. In attendance were Jim Arnette, Phil Carr, Nichole Curtiss, Kim Dorsey, Donna Duarte, Tammy Farley, Jennifer McClendon, Angela McElrath-Prosser, Richard Norment, Melinda Parton, Mary Anne Queen, Tammy Thompson, and Sharon Wahlstrom. The meeting was called to order by Phil Carr, President.

Welcome

Phil Carr welcomed all those in attendance and introduced Richard Norment for a special announcement. Mr. Norment received exciting news late Thursday afternoon when he received call from the AGA National President stating that he had been selected for Robert W. King memorial award. Mr. Norment wanted to express his thanks because the chapter nominated him and thanked Jim Arnette and Melinda Parton for putting together the nomination.

Mr. Norment also reported that he had spoken with Charlie Culkin, a former Executive Director who retired to Florida regarding next year's national conference that is being held in Orlando. Mr. Culkin mentioned that one problem with having National Conference at Orlando is that there is no local chapter in the area to support the conference and so Mr. Culkin is not expecting to receive a lot of leadership from that area. Therefore, Mr. Culkin is taking the lead in local host functions and called wanting to renew the request for chapters in the region to help support the local host functions for the 2005 conference. He is looking for 2-3 people that would be committed to being able to serve in a capacity at the site in Orlando next year. Mr. Culkin said that they think he can manage it by allowing these volunteers to work one day as a conference worker and then one day as a conference attendee. However, he is working on now this issue. There would probably not be any pre-conference travel involved since he believes that most of the activities could be handled via e-mail. Although, it would be necessary for these volunteers to arrive the Saturday before the conference to prepare some of the structure. Mr. Culkin men-

tioned that the Nashville Chapter is hosting the conference in 2007, so providing volunteers would give an opportunity for those who would be involved in the 2007 conference to gain experience in what goes into planning a conference. Mr. Culkin did not mention a specific date for a commitment. Mr. Norment indicated that we might want to make a commitment before the end of the AGA year. If we need to get directly in touch with Mr. Culkin, Richard Norment or the National Office has his contact information.

GASB MAY BE GETTING PERSONAL WITH ITS OPEB PROJECT...HOW MIGHT IT AFFECT YOU?

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) has finished its financial reporting model project and is now free to delve into many other areas of accounting and financial reporting. In other words, GASB is finishing up some old business and taking on some new. The results—OPEB—could be good or bad; it depends on your perspective.

I have seen accounting standards change the way governments do business, however because the management decisions likely have not been made concerning OPEB. However, it's too early to measure the effects of OPEB.

OPEB stands for “Other Post-Employment Benefits.” These are the benefits the government employer provides or subsidizes for its retired employees. As the name implies, the standard also includes eligible terminated employees. The focus for this article is on benefits to retirees. Unless you work for a government with a strong union influence, health insurance is likely the only benefit provided to retirees.

In Tennessee, and I believe in the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County (Metro), the amount of the healthcare premium paid on behalf of the retiree depends on the years of service. The state has two employee healthcare insurance programs for retirees.

- One for retirees before they reach 65 years of age
- Medicare Supplement program for retirees over 65

In the Medicare Supplement program, retirees' premiums are subsidized a certain amount per month on a sliding scale—30 years of service, 20-29 years, and 15-19 years. In the pre-65 program, retirees' premiums are subsidized by 60 to 80 percent of the monthly premium.

A few statistics are in order to understand the impact the proposed OPEB standard will have on state and local governments. Most large governments do not advance fund the amounts they pay for retired employees' health insurance benefits (or other retiree benefits). They engage in a practice called “pay as you go” in which the government pays the benefit claims as they arise. That is the case in Tennessee state government and in Metro government.

The proposed GASB OPEB standard is based on the accounting and financial reporting requirements for pension plans. Pension plans rely on actuaries to project the amount of money the government needs to put aside today to pay pension benefits in the future for its employees as they retire. In addition to a crystal ball, actuaries have all kinds of data (e.g., demographic data of the employee group) and models for making these valuations. The actuary gives the pension plan a number that, if funded periodically and invested, will ensure that the plan will be able to pay pension benefits when needed.

GASB will require governments to obtain actuarial valuations of its employees for OPEB purposes. GASB believes that OPEB is like pension benefits and that each year the government should recognize as an expense the employee's services provided, i.e. while the employee is “earning” the rights to the benefit. This means that governments will be required to recognize a liability for the difference between what the actuary says they should put aside and what they are actually paying. Those governments who practice pay-as-you-go will have to make a decision whether to report an OPEB liability in their accrual financial reports (government-wide financial statements) or to set aside, in a trust arrangement, the amount the actuary calculates as the recommended funding for the year.

The GASB will issue two accounting standards—one for employers and one for the plan itself. The accounting standard for the plan is effective for reporting in fiscal year ending June 30, 2007 and the employer standard the following year. Governments will have to make budgetary and management decisions and arrange for actuarial valuations considerably in advance of the effective date.

Will funding the actuaries' recommended annual contribution have an affect on employee OPEB? We won't know for certain until the governments begin their plans to implement the accounting standard.

The committee plans to continue presenting free lunch certificates for those individuals passing the exams, disbursing brochures at meetings to extol the virtues of becoming a CGFM certificate holder, and providing notice of training relevant to CGFM exam content.

The committee's training session for the CGFM Exam 2, based on AGA's development of the Exam 2 study book, was a great success. The training session included 16 attendees and the five CGFM committee members as presenters. The committee thanks all those individuals who participated in the training. Each participant received 8.0 hours of free CPE. The training should provide each participant with the necessary knowledge to pass Exam 2. If potential exam applicants need further preparation for the Exam, the Committee purchased two Exam 2 study books available for check out (for a 45 day maximum period) by individuals getting ready to take the exam. You do not have to be an AGA member; however, we would encourage you to consider the benefits of membership. The Committee also plans to offer formal training for Exams 1 and 3 (similar to the Exam 2 format) in October 2004, if sufficient interest exists. 
Fawn W. Ellis Scholarship
